## **Common Household Allergens**

- 1. <u>Cedar</u>: cedar filled beds, cedar decks or cedar decorative wood chips in the yard.
- 2. <u>Wool:</u> wool blankets, wool blend bed tops or wool carpets.
- 3. <u>Dust mites:</u> common insects in the home that are found in the carpets, cloth furniture and bedding. Vacuum carpets and cloth furniture 2-3 times a week and wash bedding with hypoallergenic or non-scented laundry detergents and dryer sheets.
- Fleas: dogs and cats can be allergic to the saliva of a flea bite. These bites can cause allergic reactions and we recommend treating for fleas year round. Typically, our winters do no produce enough frost to kill fleas.
- Scented candles, air fresheners (including plug-ins), incense, essential oils or cigarette/tobacco smoke: It is important to have all smokers wash their hand before petting your pet. Nicotine residue can cause a skin allergy.
- 6. Scented powdered carpet deodorizers.
- 7. **Grass:** blue grass is the most common allergenic grass to pets. Simply rinse or bathe your pet with water after playing in the grass, minimizing exposure.
- 8. **Pollen, mold, and dust:** to minimize issues, it is recommended to change air filters with gas forced air heating or cooling systems once a month using 3m allergen filters.
- 9. **Perfumes, cologne and scented hand lotions:** have the potential to cause allergic reactions to pets.
- 10. Feather dust: down comforters, pillows and jackets
